
The Lynda Carlberg Award was established to honor the memory of a dear friend, and to honor special individuals for their contributions to libraries.

Rebecca Hamilton



Rebecca Hamilton is currently the State Librarian of Louisiana, a position she was appointed to in 2005 making her the youngest State Librarian in the nation.

A native of Baton Rouge, Louisiana,

Rebecca earned a bachelor's degree in Psychology and a Master's degree in Library and Information Science from Louisiana State University.

She began her career in 1989 as a library associate at the West Baton Rouge Parish Library. In 1996, she became Assistant Director of the St. Mary Parish Library System and later Assistant Director for the Audubon Regional Library System, the state's only tri-parish library system. In 2001, she accepted the position of CEO/Director of the St. Mary Parish Library system and in 2003 she was named Associate State Librarian at the State Library of Louisiana.

In July of 2005 Rebecca was appointed State Librarian by Lt. Governor Mitch Landrieu. This appointment made her Louisiana's only fourth State Librarian in the agency's 84-year history. Under her direction, the State Library of Louisiana underwent a total re-organization to streamline operations and efficiencies.

She has doubled the amount of State Aid to Public Libraries, the largest increase in the history of the program and the first increase in 20 years. She also oversaw the rebuilding of the State Library's internal network and backup systems, a 3-year project, and as a result, during the storms of 2008, the State Library never lost Internet connectivity when all other offices in state government were down. She worked closely with SOLINET to obtain a \$12 Million grant to provide temporary library facilities after the storms in both Louisiana and Mississippi. Since the beginning of her administration, the State Library has implemented a new interlibrary loan system for public libraries, added content to the statewide databases, secured a line item in the annual budget for public library training and grown the annual Louisiana Book Festival to an attendance of 21,000.

In recent years, Hamilton has served on the Executive Board of the St. Mary Parish Literacy Council and the Executive Board of the Bayouland Library Consortium. She has served as a member and Secretary of the State Board of Library Examiners, the body that certifies Louisiana public library directors. She has also served the Louisiana Library Association on many committees. Most recently she was named one of the most outstanding graduates of the LSU School of Library and Information Science and has been elected to the Southeastern Library Network, Inc. (SOLINET) board of directors representing State Library Agencies. In November 2007 she was named one of the Top 40 Under 40 by the Baton Rouge Business Report.

In her spare time, Rebecca is incredibly passionate about animals and regularly rescues and fosters cats and other animals. She often holds clothing and shoe sales to fundraise for animal adoption causes and shelters.

She's incredibly generous – after the floods, she organized a clothing drive for the State Library staff who lost their homes and possessions and made sure that she found them good business suits and clothing so that they could get back on their feet. She's also a great fan of punk music and is currently working on a documentary on the Baton Rouge punk rock scene.



Curt Iles

Curt Iles is a writer living in central Louisiana and is the author of eleven books about rural Louisiana. A graduate of Louisiana College and McNeese State University, he has served as a teacher, coach, and school principal, camp director, missionary, and full-time writer/speaker.

Curt grew up in an area of Southwest Louisiana formerly known as "No Man's Land." His pioneer ancestors arrived there two hundred years ago and he is the 8th generation to live in this region of the state. After college, he and his wife of 36 years, DeDe, returned to rural Louisiana where they taught school and raised a family.

This rural piney woods area is the bedrock of many of his stories and books. In 2012, Curt and DeDe sold their home, land, and possessions, and took a two-year assignment to Africa.

During this sojourn, which stretched to three years, they served with the International Mission Board. They were based in Uganda but worked in South Sudan, Chad, and other countries.

This experience is chronicled in his short story collection, "Trampled Grass." After returning from three years in Africa, Curt and DeDe have settled in the Central Louisiana town of Alexandria.

His books are published through Creekbank Stories and contain seven short story collections, three historical novels, and one children's book. Creekbank Stories exists to share stories worth telling and that make a difference.

Curt and DeDe have three grown sons and eight grandchildren.
